- With principles/approaches directly applicable to other TBDs – AI, CSF etc




Roadmap 2020

GOAL

- To provide the SEAFMD
 Campaign a long term strategic framework to achieve FMD freedom with vaccination by year 2020
- Maintain the OIE recognised free zones without vaccination in Indonesia, Philippines, Malaysia and other areas by 2020

Objective

 employ a series of integrated and harmonised approaches to FMD control









OIE SEAFMD Campaign






BACKGROUND/CONCEPTS (1)

- Phase 1 1997 2001
 - Funding/support AusAID, Thai
 Government/Swiss Aid
 - Establish Regional Coordination Unit
 - Country linkages/high level engagement
 - Technical training

- Phase 2 2001 2005
 - Funding/support/leverage
 - Political engagement
 - Technical training expanded
 - Progressive zoning/surveillance
 - Expansion of networks: communications,
 PR, industry




BACKGROUND AND CONCEPTS (6)

- Phase 3 (2006 2011)
 - Funding/improved partnership drive
 - Refine zones epidemiological and laboratory analyses
 - Socio economic developments including gender issues

- Phase 4 (2011 2015) and Phase 5 (2015 2020)

STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS (1)

- High level political policy support and endorsement
- Core funding
- Step by step approach
- Strengthened veterinary services
- International coordination, national support and leverage



INTERNATIONAL COORDINATION AND LEVERAGE

- FAO Case Example
 - FAO/Upper Mekong activities; economic studies; manage AusAID project in Philippines
- Other ASEAN, France, NZ, Australian Biosecurity CRC, ACIAR, EC
- National
- Leverage 4/1



STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS (2)

- Re enforcement of animal control measures
 - Animal movement
 - More refined approaches to surveillance, diagnostics and reporting
 - Strategic vaccination in control zones for up to 3 years to achieve acceptable immunity levels in buffalo and cattle
 - Maintainance of freedom
- Mobilisation of stakeholder and public support
- Cultural change

- Animal movement management



















SEAFMD 2004 **OIE FMD Free Zone FMD Infected Areas**










GOVERNANCE, MONITORING AND EVALUATION (1)





GOVERNANCE, MONITORING AND EVALUATION (2)

- Monitoring and Evaluation
 - Activities (60) based to outcomes based (10)
 - Simplified system, practical but rigourous
 - Can apply to other sub Regional Representation activities



ACHIEVEMENTS

- Mature, well recognised and supported system
- Technical/scientific networks in place with effective collaborative arrangements – Pakchong OIE FMD Approved Reference Laboratory
- Extensive training e.g. 800 trained in outbreak investigation
- Collaborative activities e.g. PhD students; market chain systems
- Maintenance of FMD Freedom in Indonesia and zones e.g. Philippines, non peninsular Malaysia



SUCCESS FACTORS

- Political support national/international level
- Finance and resource support
- Leadership, planning, engagement, pragmatism, proportionality
- Strong governance
- Effective veterinary services
- Cultural change



CONCLUDING REMARKS

- Technical solutions are available issues are primarily institutional
- Learn from each other recognise skills and knowledge don't reside in any one area
- Customise approaches within a general guiding principles framework
- Leverage activities directly and indirectly
- Maintain the momentum



Recommendations

- Recognise the critical importance of institutional arrangements such as effective government services, stakeholder involvement, governance and resource allocations in preventing, managing and eradicating FMD
- Agree to ongoing communications and meetings to reinforce the lessons that can be learned from national, regional and subregional programs so that program approaches can be improved.
- Recognise and utilise the expertise the knowledge and expertise that
 resides in countries of the world and recognise that although the
 general principles of diseases management are well under they can
 be customised to suit the particular needs of a country, region or sub
 region
- Emphasise the importance and value of introducing simple but effective monitoring and evaluation systems to assess progress and modify progam activities in the light of findings.
- Support ongoing reviews of the OIE Codes requirements on FMD to take into account new developments and needs, for example transition from vaccinated to non vaccinated free status.
